A participle clause contains either a present participle, e.g. seeing, a past participle, e.g. seen, or a perfect participle, e.g. having seen. TIME CLAUSES. A) to replace a time clause to show that an action took place while another was already in progress. Walking down the street on Saturday, I saw Simon. (replaces As/ When/ While I was walking) B) to replace a time clause to indicate that the event in the subordinate clause comes immediately before the event in the main clause.

Participle Clauses-English

The perfect participle, passive (having been -ed) is used when the action of the participle clause happens before the action of the main clause. The participle clause usually comes first: Having been attacked during his previous visit, he was very careful about where he went. The past participle (-ed) has a passive meaning. The participle clause usually comes first. It can express 1 cause: Ignored by the other children, the boy played by himself.
